SD Mines Hosts North American Mine Ventilation Symposium

<u>South Dakota Mines</u> will host the 19th <u>North</u> <u>American Mine Ventilation Symposium</u> in collaboration with the Underground Ventilation Committee (UVC) of the Society for Mining, Metallurgy & Exploration (SME) from June 17-22, 2023.

Proper airflow and ventilation are critical for safety and operational activities inside a mine. The symposium promotes the exchange of ideas and research in a wide range of ventilation topics, including auxiliary and primary systems, mine fans, case studies, computational fluid dynamics applications, diesel particulate control, electric machinery, mine cooling and refrigeration, mine dust monitoring and control, mine fires and explosion prevention, mine gases, mine heat, mine ventilation and automation, occupational health and safety, renewable/alternative energy, monitoring and measurement, network analysis and optimization and planning and design.

"The North American Mine Ventilation Symposium, held every two to three years since 1982, provides a forum for ventilation experts, practitioners, educators, students, researchers, regulators, manufacturers and suppliers from around the world to exchange knowledge, ideas and opinions in the ventilation of mines, tunnels and other underground facilities such as the Sanford Underground Research Facility in the Black Hills," says Purushotham Tukkaraja, Ph.D., the NAMVS 2023 symposium chair and an associate professor in the Department of Mining Engineering and Management at SD Mines.

The NAMVS 2023 is a peer-reviewed symposium with parallel workshop sessions (two days), three full-day parallel technical sessions, including keynote sessions, panel discussions and exhibit booths, followed by mine tours. The symposium features an exhibit hall in the Fraser Gym at Mines with 20 booths. Exhibitors showcase their

cutting-edge technology with live demonstrations. Technical sessions will be held in the Classroom Building rooms 204 E & W. The conference hosts almost 200 participants from around the world with representation from the United States, Canada, South Africa, Kazakhstan, Germany, Australia, Chile, Spain and more.

"I am grateful to all members of the symposium organizing committee for their help with peerreviewing papers and chairing technical sessions, and a special thanks to our sponsors and exhibitors for their support and for helping make the symposium possible. Thanks to the campus Facilities, Risk and Services, Center for Alumni Relations and Advancement (CARA), the Office of Scheduling and Event Operations, Sodexo Dining Services and the Office of Marketing and Communications at South Dakota Mines for their help and support in organizing this international symposium on campus," says Tukkaraja.

September is Suicide Prevention Month

Like safety, wellbeing is not about protecting you *from* something, it is about protecting you *for* something. Because the month of September is suicide prevention month, we'd like to focus on what we can do to recognize the signs of someone who is in distress and what actions we can take to help them get the care they need. The focus is on simple steps that could change a life.

We can all make a difference in the lives of those who might be struggling by having regular, meaningful conversations about life's ups and downs. Have a sincere conversation and be engaged with those around you whether at home, work, talking with neighbors, or making small talk at a café or coffee house.

If you feel like something's not quite the same with someone you know – there's something going on in their life or notice a change in what they're doing or saying – trust that gut instinct and take the time to ask them "Are you OK?"

By acting as 'eyes and ears' and reaching out to anyone who is going through a tough time we can show them they're supported and encourage them to access help sooner.

"Your awesome, Ellie!" 2nd shift boosters. This was written on a plant work area whiteboard a few years ago by one of the booster shift leads, only a couple of weeks before he committed suicide. He was a very motivated and driven individual supporting Ellie and his colleague. He cared about his team, and the work they did so much that he went out of his way to go above and beyond and encouraged his crew to do the same. He was critical, without being disrespectful, and was one of the first people to really trust me as a member of the leadership team.

That message has remained on Ellie's whiteboard since 2019 with no intention of ever erasing it, because it helps remind her and colleagues that it's so often the people who work hard to build up those around them who are most in need of help themselves.

Mental health and suicide are things that not many people want to talk about but have touched a lot of lives. South Dakota had the 7th highest suicide rate in the nation in 2021 with 202 and 2022 with 191. Over the last ten years suicide deaths have increased by 50%.

There are options to assist with suicide prevention such as national crisis number (988) or with company health insurance Support Links. <u>R U OK?</u> is a global program to lend a hand for us to possibly assist friends and colleagues. Think about being here to hear when talking and engaging. A small effort will not go unnoticed by someone wanting to talk.

Call 988 for:

- Help with mental-health related distress
- Suicide crisis or having suicidal thoughts
- Help with substance use disorders
- Behavioral health resources and treatment options
- 24/7 emotional support
